WANGOOM COMMON SCHOOL

(article compiled & submitted by Irene Sheppard)

The Wangoom Common School records date back to October 12, 1865. The school seems to have changed from a Common School to a State School during 1873. In 1878 - 1879, there appears to have been a night school held. The Inspector's report on the 27th June 1879 reads:

"Inspected the school on a stormy night when there was 12 present.
 Organisation - The subjects of the programme except Grammer and Geography this Term.
 Instruction - School work proceeds smoothly and the pupils are all kept constantly employed. The programme save the subjects mentioned above is carried out. The 3rd class should read 3rd book.
 Discipline - good.
 Records - correctly kept and completed to date".

This book gives the age and results of tests only. There is no indication of who the child's parents are. On the inspection day of 12th October, 1865, the following pupils attended the school:

SALT LAKE CITY 1994

On 21st October 1994, members Lorraine Smith and John Culver joined Melbourne AIGS members, escorted by Jenny Carter, on a genealogical trip to Salt Lake City, Utah. Here is a brief account of some of the interesting moments of the trip.

We headed for the plane, all lugging our family research notes in our cabin baggage (never, never, let your notes go with the luggage we were told). A problem then arose with the weight of our cabin baggage (5 kg limit - since when have they had a 5 kg limit? everyone grumbled), so a rapid re-shuffling occurred with this going in here, and that going in there, but still hanging onto our research notes, of course! Well, we managed OK & headed on through to the departure lounge. Alas, one of our lot was missing, only to arrive huffing shortly after saying "I had to send my notes with the luggage, they gave me a plastic bag to put my other things in". "Oh well" we said "they'll be right, nothing will happen" & secretly thinking, "she shouldn't have sent her notes with the luggage". Nevertheless, off we went, arriving in Salt Lake after a long, tiring flight, only to find the unthinkable had happened! She who shall be nameless, was missing a bag, the only bag left on the luggage carousel was another which looked very similar, but was not it. Yes, it was the bag with the research notes in it. We couldn't believe it, how could she be so unlucky? Enquiries led us nowhere, we had to just wait and hope that the person with the bag would realise their mistake & bring it back, hopefully they weren't on another plane, heading elsewhere. Well, the good news is that the bag was recovered and delivered to our hotel later on that night. Following our initial drama, the rest of the 2 week trip was plain sailing and we had a great time. Days and most evenings were spent at the library (right next door to our hotel) from 7:30am to 10:00 pm, Monday to Saturday. Sundays we did a bit of sight-seeing and shopping. We all found something new in our family research, some of us went back numerous generations, and it was so quick, with so many records at our fingertips. We came home tired, but fulfilled, with plans (at least in my case) to go again. Another "Salt Lake City with Jenny" trip is being planned for 1996
