May I wish you all good researching for 1999. Here we are into March 1999. How time flies!

It is time to reflect on our direction as a club and the service we provide our members. I urge all our members to attend some of our meetings. By attending you can contribute your thoughts and have a say in what you think about how we are performing as a club.

The age of the computer and the Internet is certainly upon us. Let me share an experience that demonstrates this.

My web page has some 6000 names in various pedigrees of the family. On one page I have a small coloured painting of the "Royal Charter", the auxiliary steam ship which brought my g/grandfather to Australia in 1856, with just a few words about the vessel. A researcher in Canada sent me an e-mail asking where I found the painting as a relative of his was drowned when the Royal Charter sank in 1859.

He was not doing any genealogical research, or looking at the pedigree. He had asked his search programme to find any mention of the ship, "Royal Charter."

Think of all the documents on the Internet. Although my site is not a maritime one and although he had made the search a few times, my site was the only reference found.

Using the technology available is revolutionising the way we do our research and has brought a boom in genealogy and in people's interest in their forebears.

From the Warrnambool Standard 28th November 1929

I will now tell your readers something about the spot we never forget, though there we are forgotten. **I refer to the old Church of England Grammar School, which stood on the Hopkins River, just near the bridge. **

It was opened in 1869 by Henry Kemmis B A (Carey). It flourished until December 1871, when the business was transferred to Ellerslie House, Warrnambool. The old school-house and surrounding ground was subsequently purchased by MJ. George Rolfe, a Melbourne merchant, who so transformed and improved the property, as the case may be, that it now looks like the ancestral home of a duke.

In 1871 quite a gloom was cast not only over the school but the town. Two of the assistant masters, Mr. Greer and Mr. Weiss went to bathe at the mouth of the Hopkins; they were carried out to sea. Mr. Weiss was rescued, but Mr. Greer's body was never seen again, dead or alive.

In conclusion I may state that Warrnambool is a very beautiful city, but as Ovid told the ladies two thousand years ago: "In vain you're fair if you remain unknown." We will have to "boost" the place and let the outside world know about the treasures we have to show them.

The wild and rugged coast line from Cape Otway to Lady Bay, the gorges, the inlets and the rocks cannot be surpassed. I have been seven times around and through the world and have seen nothing to equal the wild and rugged coast - no doubt millions of years old - that anyone may see by taking a trip to Warrnambool in the Casino on a calm day. And then every gorge or inlet has a past history - some wrecks or disaster attached to it, which makes it doubly interesting.

My advice to anyone contemplating a trip abroad is -

SEE WARRNAMBOOL FIRST.

FIRES ATTENDED BY THE WARRNAMBOOL FIRE BRIGADE IN 1923

(As reported at the Fire Brigade's Annual Meeting in January 1924)

'The number of fires has been slightly in advance of the previous year. The Brigade promptly responded to seven calls of fires as follow: December 10, Mrs Coult's shop, Liebig-street, estimated value building and contents £1,259, estimated damage £230; December 26, Mr D Ferguson dwelling house, Raqlan Parade, estimated value buildings and contents £550, estimated damage £30; January 14, Mr C Humohrevs. buggy shed, Fairy-street, buildings and contents £25, damage £12; February 28, Mrs Bostock, wash-house, Lava-street, value buildings and contents £50, total loss; March 24, P J McGennan and Co. box factory, and contents £10,650, total loss; this was a very disastrous fire owing to the inflammable nature of the contents, and the fact that the fire had obtained a strong hold before the alarm was received, also a very poor supply of water, the fire being outside the regular service area having only a two-inch pipe to draw from. The efforts of the Brigade were practically useless. May 8, Mrs Oliver, Banvan-street, wash-house, buildings and contents £70, damage £55; May 27, Mrs T Lynch, Criterion Hotel, value buildings and contents £3,250, damage £52. Total estimated value of buildings and contents, £15,845; estimated damage £11,079.'

Mention was also made of Firemen Beatty and Grimshaw who won the Two Men Marshall Event in the competitions for trophies, with Station-keeper Bristol and Fireman Thompson runners-up. Praise was also given to Drill Instructor, F Williamson, for 'the very able manner in which he prepared the team' for the annual demonstration at Ballarat.
