When I was going through the issues of the Warrnambool Examiner, I came across this story in the issue dated 25th September 1866, and thought it may be of interest to members. The incident happened at Port Fairy.

BRAVE AND NOBLE FEAT

On Tuesday the 11 th inst., as Mr. John Griffiths, of the Harbour Department, was at the lookout house on the Flagstaff Hill, he saw a young man named Michael Driscoll walking about the jetty. Going into the house for the telescope, he stayed but a moment, and on coming outside, perceived that Driscoll had disappeared, and that his dog was looking over the side of the jetty. Griffiths immediately ran to the spot, and stooping down saw the youth struggling in deep water. His first impulse was to leap in, but it occurred to him that both might be drowned, so he clambered on one of the cross beams, and twisting his legs round the timber, threw his body forward, and was just able to grasp the now exhausted youth by the hair, and drag him into the cross piece. To get him on the jetty was a work of great difficulty, but Griffiths, who is a powerful man, at length succeeded in placing him in safety. This is the third person, we understand, that this gallant man has rescued from a watery grave.

BROOKSIDE REFORMATORY.

**ALLEGATIONS OF OVERWORK AND
CRUELTY.**

Ballarat, July 16.

Some further details are available regarding the recent escape of seven girls from the Brookside Reformatory, at Pitfield. As previously stated the girls, whose ages range from 15 to 18 years, surrendered to the police at Napoleons after they had been at large for about 48 hours without food or shelter, although the weather was bitterly cold. They complained of harsh treatment at the Reformatory, but are apparently unanimous in exonerating Mrs. Rowe, the foundress of the institution. Their story has been embodied in a report by Constable Clifford, and his superior officer has attached a memorandum recommending that an inquiry should be held concerning the statements made.

The names of the escapees are Jessie Nairn, Mabel Masterton, Rosina Milman, Daisy Sawyer, Harriet Walkerton, Selina Wilson and Nellie Mennillon. Subject to an inquiry their allegations are given for what they are worth. They allege that they had been forced to fell, saw, split and cart timber; to dig post-holes, load and cart gravel, repair roads, plough and harrow and assist in harvesting operations, as well as to do washing and other domestic duties.

They further averred that the slightest neglect in carrying out these duties resulted in their being flogged with a heavy leathern strap. Two of the girls exhibited marks on their arms which seemingly indicated undue severity, and they added that another girl, 12 years of age, is at present confined to her bed at the reformatory with her hands tied and her body covered with bruises caused by a flogging. It appears that escapades of this kind are not unusual, and the girls stated that their punishment would include the cutting off of their hair, a bread-and-water diet for at least a month, floggings, and employment as field laborers without boots or stockings.

REJOINER FROM A FORMER OFFICER

Miss Watson, the matron of the Servants' Training Institute in Berry-street, East Melbourne, was formerly a member of the staff of the Brookside Reformatory, and she is emphatic in her opinion that the statements' of the escaped girls are unfounded. "The girls that are sent to Brookside are all children of criminal parents. They will invent tales about anybody - not only will they distort facts, but they will make the most extraordinary charges which have not the slightest foundation. From what I know of Brookside, and those who manage it, I am convinced that the girls are not telling the truth. Mrs Rowe, who founded the home, is the owner of Glenfine Estate, and is a splendid manager, and one of the kindest women in the world. Miss King, the present matron, is also a woman of the same sort, and I am convinced that neither of them would countenance any ill-treatment of the girls. Of course the home is conducted in a rigid manner, which might seem all the more severe to girls accustomed to the freedom and wild excitement of the city streets, and the discipline is sometimes so irksome to them that it has to be maintained by corporal punishment with a cane. The heavy work which they refer to is certainly given to them. These girls are mostly unfitted for domestic service, and they usually drift into farm life. The work is hard, certainly; but I never saw a girl compelled to do more than a fair amount, and I do not believe that either Mrs Rowe or Miss King would try to exact it from them.

Mr Miller, the secretary of the Neglected Childrens' department, will tell you of the immense amount of good the Brookside Reformatory has accomplished. Though the children they receive from the Royal-park depot are all classed as juvenile criminals, many are so merely from parental neglect, and these are nearly all converted into respectable working girls. Even among the rest, a large number are reformed, take situations in the country, and finally settle down and get married."
